Each year on Passover ("Pesach" in Hebrew) we recount the humble birth of the Jewish nation. Forged out of the harshest slavery, we were redeemed from corrupt Ancient Egypt through G-d's open miracles. In powerful Egypt, the Jews prospered until forced by their jealous hosts into slavery. Egyptian barbarism increased, until king Pharaoh decreed that every male child born be drowned! One child saved, Moshe (Moses), emerged as the agent of our redemption – bringing the Divine call to worship, promising freedom.
